






# A long view highlights the importance of flexibility and quality for sustained growth amidst sector cycles






Consistent growth in total tertiary market since 2004, despite underlying volatility in segments – largely driven by private market overreaction to policies and then reactive government policy



Immigration policy drove 50% increase in international from 2006-2010; policy changes, media attention on student issues, and AUD led to 20% drop in 2012 with stable growth resuming 2-3 years later




Exponential growth in VET FEE-HELP loans since introduction in 2009, from \$26M to \$3B in 2015; government crack down to clean up sector abruptly; after correction phase expect market will stabilise, with overall tertiary trends intact

## 2016 has brought new challenges, notably a vocational sector in crisis



#### New VET Reforms Dec 2015...

- Loans available to any provider capped at prior year level
- Payments now in arrears vs. up front on expectation
- Recruitment obstacles
  - Physical proof of high school certificate
  - Student ID registration
  - Literacy & numeracy exams
  - Cooling off periods between acceptance and loan applications and application and start
  - Enrolment cycle shortened by ~2-3 weeks
- Additional regulations on brokers and 3<sup>rd</sup> parties


- Of the top 8 VET FEE HELP recipients 2013-15 (THINK is #4) we are the only provider not being closed down or under investigation

### VET – boom to bust




#### Expenditure by education sector in Australia 2004 - 2014.



#### **Key trends 2014 & 2015**

■ Private VET ■ Public VET ■ Private HE ■ Public HE

- Economy stable across all key metrics but with AUD and commodities weaker since 2015
- Private HE remains fastest growing segment
- 2015 VET reforms will cut government loans to the private sector by as much as half (\$1.5-3bn)
- International growth to continue, with ambitious government policies aiming to double enrolments by 2025
- Public universities on average continue to enjoy uncapped places and are growing in low single digits by lowering standards and increasing international enrolments
- Overall as the only pure private university, and one of <100 private higher education providers with increasing international strength, we are well positioned relative to market opportunities


## Access to tertiary education is growing around the world

Global Tertiary education participation rates (Proportion of 18-22 years olds in post secondary education)



# Forecast growth of Transnational Education: Southern Africa's great opportunity





Rising demand for transnational higher education is forecast to be particularly strong in Africa, as youth populations swell.

Over the past decade, transnational education has gone from a niche sector to a more than US\$25 billion opportunity, growing by US\$1 billion a year

International higher education student flows are increasing, but the traditional destination countries such as the US and UK are seeing their proportion of enrolments decreasing.

There are already 130,000 African students studying elsewhere in Africa, a number which is growing rapidly through a combination of demographic pressures and economic growth.

In the longer term, this presents a huge opportunity for South Africa as the continent's pre-eminent higher education sector.
